The Annual Drive plays a key role in funding the difference between tuition income and the school operations budget. Our "Old Boys"

Graduates of Western are familiarly referred to as our Old Boys, reminiscent of a British boys school tradition which we share. The Old Boys continue to be part of our Western Community well after they graduate. They return to school during the year to attend annual events like the Pigskin Classic football tournament and the El Classico soccer game. Many also maintain close friendships with faculty members who continue to mentor them. As we follow these young men grow through high school, college, technical school or the military, we witness Men Truly Alive!



Stephen Dunne (2012) was a founding student when Western opened its doors in September, 2010 and a member of Western's first graduating class. Stephen attended St. Thomas High School, and later, at age 17, qualified for a National Merit Scholarship.



Stephen used his scholarship to attend the University of Oklahoma, and graduated in December 2017 Magna Cum Laude in Biochemistry at the age of 20. Stephen is officially the first college graduate of Western Academy. Stephen currently works in a research lab at OU and is applying to medical school.

Thomas Armentor (2014), (pictured on the left) now at Texas A&M University gave the Old Boy address at the Founding Roots Dinner. Below is an excerpt from his speech.

"The Glory of God is a Man Fully Alive," the idea that through school and our parents we would develop into a "whole" person: intellectual, moral, physical, and spiritual. One of the first experiences of this journey came in the form of Mr. Hebert's art class when he taught us calligraphy. The beauty and difficulty of it drew me in completely. Over the course of my time at Western, I continued to develop apprentice skills and after graduating, I have been asked to write the calligraphy all of Western's graduation diplomas. I cannot think of another school where a student has the opportunity to learn an intricate art form and then give back that skill as an Old Boy. That is something very special to me. My journey to become a man fully alive continued through the many plays of Western Academy. These are not your ordinary middle school plays, they are based on classic tales (like Where the Wild Things are or The Wind in the Willows) but written by the faculty and tailored to the Western boys. And they are not only plays but musicals! One of the more traditional manly aspects I enjoyed most about WA was the competition that it fostered in its students. Western Academy could not be Western Academy without it's group of men fully alive, its incredible teachers. In their everyday lives, from teaching to coaching, their commitment to us and to the school taught us what it means to be a man. We are all part of this tree, branches, limbs, leaves, and trunk. Each family, each student, each teacher plays his part - and we have produced a tree that is fourishing! A tree that will last forever, but we will always remember our roots.
