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I. Introduction

The faculty and staff of Western Academy work with parents to assist in the intellectual, moral, physical, and spiritual education of the boys and young men entrusted to them. They provide quality academic, athletic and cultural programs for boys in grades three through eight, as well as opportunities for parents to get involved with the life of Western Academy.

Western Academy offers a liberal arts education that focuses on the development of intellectual and moral virtues, helping to foster the practice of concentrated study and a sincere interest in the abundant goodness of the world. Its curriculum is strongly grounded in the classic texts of western civilization. The all-male faculty strives to present a good Christian example of someone struggling to do the ordinary things of life extraordinarily well for the love of God and in the service of others. All student programs take place in the context of a personal approach to education where cheerfulness goes hand-in-hand with hard work and a striving to develop good habits and virtues.

This Parent Handbook is intended to serve as an overview of Western Academy, its philosophy and programs. It is not exhaustive by any means, but will accomplish its purpose if it introduces some of what Western Academy has to offer.

Western Academy opened in 2010, starting as a middle and lower school on Butlercrest Street in west Houston, aiming to prepare boys for success in high school while inculcating in them a deep Christian formation and an adventurous approach to life's challenges and their personal growth.

II. Academics

Study and Homework

Study is the first priority of students. This activity occurs at school, in the classroom, and at home. Time spent each school night on homework should be about 30-45 minutes for lower school students and up to 1 hour and 45 minutes for middle school students. A regular time (earlier in the afternoon rather than later) and a regular place for homework, study and review help develop the habits of mind necessary to succeed academically.

Students who are absent from school are expected to make up the work they missed as soon as they reasonably can. Participation in athletics or other activities does not excuse a student from academic responsibilities.

Classes

Classes are where the spirit of study intensifies. It is the responsibility of a student to be materially, physically, and mentally prepared for study and class work. Students are expected to bring pens, pencils, notebooks, textbooks, and any other required materials to class. Students need regular amounts of sleep as well as a healthy breakfast and lunch in order to be able to concentrate. Punctuality and outward appearance in dress and posture are signs of a student's attitude and willingness to work.

Report Cards

Report cards are issued quarterly to parents. Progress reports are sent home midway between reporting periods.

Low Academic Performance

Western Academy provides students with a sufficiently demanding, but not overbearing curriculum. We expect students to work hard and perform well academically. Students who consistently receive poor grades will be notified of their low academic performance and given time to improve. A meeting may be held with parents to work out some concrete areas in which a student needs to grow. If a student fails to improve after certain interventionary steps have been taken, he may be required to complete makeup work during the summer in order to move on to the subsequent grade level. Habitual low academic performance can also be a cause for a student to be removed from the school.

Academic Honesty

Academic honesty is critical to Western Academy's mission. By academic dishonesty, students commit an injustice against others, damage morale, and harm themselves by replacing honest effort with fraud.

An offense against academic honesty may lead to a failing grade and parental notification. A second offense may result in lack of credit, immediate parental conference, failure for the marking period in which the offense is committed, and suspension.

Academic Probation

A student will be placed on academic probation if he is habitually delinquent with homework or receives a D+ or below in two or more subjects on his quarterly report card. A student's academic probation will be re-evaluated after the subsequent quarterly report card.

Academic Probation may consist of any or all of the following:

- Ineligibility to play sports or to participate in clubs or other extra-curricular activities
- Tutoring before and/or after school
- Making up or redoing all outstanding or inadequate work in the subjects for which the student earned a D+ or below

A student on academic probation may be suspended or expelled if he:

- Continues to be habitually delinquent with homework
- Receives a D+ or below in two or more classes on his subsequent report card
- Fails in any way to abide by any other terms of his academic probation

III. Other Programs for Students

Advisory

Advisory is an essential ingredient in the mission of Western Academy. It ensures that each boy is understood, advised, and encouraged on a personal level. Since the school's opening, advisory has been taking place with informal, one-on-one conversations between faculty members and students throughout the school day.

Homeroom teachers have a special advisory role in their homeroom classes. A homeroom teacher takes note of each boy's strengths, as well as areas in which he may improve. He supports and encourages his homeroom students to strive for virtue and right conduct, dealing with each boy on a personal level. Lower school students meet one-on-one with their homeroom teachers quarterly.

In addition to the daily guidance of their homeroom teachers, middle school students meet monthly with a selected advisor who serves as his mentor at the school. This advisor takes a special interest in the student's overall growth as a man, and helps him set clear and effective goals for self-improvement. There exists between the student and advisor a relationship of confidence and trust, where the student knows he will be understood and helped in any area of his life.

Advisors are indicated on each student's report card. In order to ensure that advisory at Western is successful, parents must be involved in their son's growth and understanding of himself. All parents are encouraged to be in touch with their son's advisor on a consistent basis.

The Houses of Western Academy

Western Academy is divided (students, faculty, and staff) into four houses. The house names are taken from the four elements of the school's coat of arms, each with a motto connected to the ideals that complete a Western Academy man: (1) The House of the Raven—wisdom; (2) The House of the Shell—daring; (3) The House of the Water—contemplation; and, (4) The House of the Green—hope. Siblings and first cousins are typically sorted into the same house.

The Houses of Western serve many important purposes:

- They communicate and encourage the embodiment of the school's ideals;
- They strengthen the enthusiasm and spirit for Western Academy and give the community a strong sense of belonging to a tradition and family;
- The house competitions are “rallying points” throughout the year marked by festival days that include holy Mass, competitions, a worthy meal, and spirited games;
- The houses encourage leadership and a sense of pride at Western Academy.

Extracurricular Activities and Sports

A number of clubs and activities are available at Western Academy. They are geared toward the realization of the school's objectives and are considered part of school life. Although extracurricular activities play a vital role in the school, no club or sport activities are scheduled during class hours except for special occasions.

Sports Teams

Western Academy will field teams (provided sufficient participation) in the following sports for grades 6, 7, and 8:

Fall:

- Football
- Cross Country

Winter:

- Basketball
- Soccer
- Wrestling

Spring:

- Baseball
- Rugby
- Track

Tryouts may be held at the beginning of each season to determine the team's roster. Students will be notified of the dates and times of these events.

Field Trips

Field trips provide a valuable educational purpose as they offer a targeted learning experience outside the classroom. These planned, occasional outings complement the curriculum while offering a break from the normal class schedule. Field trips present an opportunity for the bonds of friendship to strengthen through conversation and the shared experience of enjoying an adventurous excursion to a site of interest.

Transportation Policy

Students may be transported to and from campus for field trips, sports practices and games in school vans or in parent driven carpools. Parental permission is required for all school related transportation. Drivers of school vehicles will be employees or volunteers of Western Academy, and they must be licensed and insured drivers. Drivers are not permitted to use their phone while transporting students to or from a school activity.

IV. Guidelines for Students

Attendance

Regular and punctual attendance is expected of all students at Western Academy.

The School Day

Western Academy's classes begin at 8:20 a.m.; Monday through Thursday dismissal is at 3:20 p.m.; Friday dismissal is at 2:20 p.m.; on Half Days dismissal is at 12:10 p.m. Study Hall and approved areas on campus will be open to students from 3:30 to 4:30 p.m., Monday-Thursday. Students who regularly need to be picked up after 4:30 p.m. must make an arrangement with the school for extended care and a fee may be required. All students must be picked up by 5:00 p.m.

Absence

In case of absence from school for illness or some other serious reason, a parent or guardian must notify their son's homeroom teacher and any teacher whose class their son will miss. Upon the student's return to school, any relevant doctor's notes may be given to the front desk. Students who are absent from school are expected to make up the work they missed as soon as they reasonably can. Participation in athletics or other school-sponsored activities does not excuse a student from academic responsibilities.

Tardiness

The school day begins at 8:20 a.m. A student who comes to school after 8:20 a.m. must come to the front office to notify the front desk staff and receive a tardy slip. The student must then hand the tardy slip to his teacher to be admitted into class.

Extended Absence

If parents wish to take a student out of school for several days for personal reasons, please notify the homeroom teacher and the respective head of school.

Early Dismissal

If it is necessary to leave campus during the school day, a note indicating the reason, dated and signed by a parent or guardian, must be presented before the beginning of school to the main office. The front office will notify the homeroom teacher concerning the early dismissal. It is a good idea to email the homeroom teacher indicating this as well. At the time of early pickup, parents must come to the front office to sign the student out.

Any work covered during the missed class is the responsibility of the student. Frequent absence and habitual tardiness are detrimental to a student and his studies. A parental conference may be requested if there is a problem with attendance or punctuality.

Returning Mid-Day

Students returning to school after appointments must come to the front office to receive a return slip from front desk staff. The student must then hand the return slip to his teacher to be readmitted into class.

Personal Appearance

Being well groomed and properly dressed is a sign of respect for oneself and others. It is also a means to encourage the seriousness of one's work and develop an eye toward adulthood. The dress code and its enforcement improve the overall tone of the school. Western also requires personal grooming that allows for eye contact to be made easily. Therefore, each student must keep his hair out of his eyes during the school day, or cut his hair appropriately so that this is not difficult to accomplish.

8th Grade:

- **Shirt:** Lands' End short or long sleeve oxford shirt with WA logo (French blue, bright chamois, or blue)
- **Pants Only:** Lands' End khaki chino or active chino pants
- **Blazer or Sportcoat, & Dress Shoes:** must be worn during all school masses and graduation
- **Tie or bowtie**
- **Belt**
- **Socks:** solid white, brown, black, navy blue, or grey only
- **Shoes:** white, brown, black, navy blue, dark green, or grey only
- **PE uniform:** PE shirt & shorts
- **WA Outerwear options:** Lands' End pullover or zip-up hoodie with WA logo (classic navy and evergreen), Lands' End rain jacket with WA logo (navy blue), Lands' End quarter-zip, or full-zip fleece with WA logo (classic navy or evergreen), Land's End boys performance fine gauge v-neck sweater with WA logo (classic navy or evergreen)

Outerwear Note: WA allows heavy jackets for the cold weather, but all other lighter outerwear must be WA outerwear. *This includes high school hoodies.*

The complete school uniform must be worn at all times during school hours with the following exceptions: PE uniform must be worn during physical education period; field trips, provided that the faculty guide or the Headmaster has specified another appropriate manner of dress.

If a student has a legitimate reason to be out of proper dress, he must have a signed and currently dated note from a parent.

Medication Protocol and Student Illness

Parents of students who require occasional over-the-counter medication are to inform the front office and provide clearly labeled medications. This information should be reported in the medical release. Without documentation, a phone call will be needed to confirm parental consent before Western Academy administers any medication. If a student is contagious (cough, fever, etc.) he should be kept at home until the illness has passed.

Please do **NOT** send your son to school if he has or has had:

1. Fever over 100 F within the last 24 hours (must be fever free without medication).
2. Vomiting and/or diarrhea within the 12 hours before the start of the school day.
3. Continuous coughing not relieved with cough medicine.
4. Strep throat. They may return 24 hours after starting antibiotics as long as they are fever free.

State law requires that all students have current immunization records. These records need to be turned in to the main office to complete enrollment for the school year. If parents request and receive a state exemption from immunization, they must supply the official affidavit in place of the records before the school year begins.

Special note on lice: Parents whose sons have contracted lice should immediately contact the Head of School. Infected students are expected to eradicate all lice before returning to school.

Meanwhile, Western Academy will notify all appropriate families via e-mail to prevent the spread of lice.

School Supplies

Your son will have all his school supplies provided by the school, including the replenishment of supplies during the academic year. Personalized packets will be delivered to students on the first day of school.

Personal Property

All personal belongings of a student are his own responsibility. It is advisable for students to label personal property with their names. Names should be included on backpacks, jackets, clothing, books, calculators and other items. Prudence dictates against bringing large amounts of money or valuables to school.

Some personal belongings should not be brought to school. Cell phones, tablets, electronic reading devices, smart watches, music players, handheld game players and other types of personal belongings not appropriate in a school atmosphere are not permitted on campus, neither before, during, nor after the school day or on any school-sponsored trip.

Cell Phones & Smart Watches

Teachers and administrators have noticed significant distractions as a result of text messaging, videos, images, and cell phone games. For the purpose of student focus, and the general social health of both the student and the school as a whole, it is required that students who have cell phones or smart watches leave them at home. Any necessary communication between the student and his parent should be made via Western Academy's main line or the appropriate classroom extension.

Students who are found to have cell phones or smart watches on campus will need to give them to their Head of School. The item will only be returned to one of his parents after a conversation with the Head of School.

Campus Businesses

Students are not allowed to buy or sell food or other merchandise to other students on campus, neither before, during, nor after the school day, or on any school sponsored trip or official school carpool.

Textbooks

Textbooks are the property of Western Academy and must be treated with respect. Students will be expected to pay for or replace lost or carelessly damaged materials.

Lost and Found

The Lost and Found is located in the cabinets of the covered patio of the red brick building. Periodically any unmarked or unclaimed items are organized for sale back to the community, or otherwise given to charity.

Student Drop-Off and Pick-Up Procedures

All students must be picked up in the front of the school, either in the first driveway or the second driveway. Students may not be picked up further down the driveway, at the gate, or on Butlercrest Street. To help ensure the safety of our students, please follow the direction

procedures at drop-off and pick-up. Pedestrians always have the right-of-way. In addition, parents are asked to do the following:

- drive slowly,
- drop off and pick up students at the circle only,
- advance in the right lane as the car in front of you moves forward,
- do not leave cars unattended in the driveway,
- do not use cell phones during pick-up and drop-off times,
- park in a designated space if necessary.

Communication Procedures

Parents who need to contact their sons at school should call the front office and leave a message with the front desk. The message will be sent to your son via his homeroom teacher. If parents need to contact a teacher, they may seek him out in conversation after school or e-mail him directly. Informing teachers of your son's absence is best done by submitting an e-mail to the homeroom teacher, as well as any teacher whose class your son will miss.

School Closing due to Inclement Weather

Western Academy will decide on school closings, delayed openings, and early dismissals. A communication will be sent to parents and posted on the school website if there is any change to the regular school schedule. Parents must judge the weather conditions of their own areas and use their discretion in following these guidelines.

Student Records

Student records are confidential. Requests for transcripts and student records should be by written request of a parent or guardian. A current balance is required for the release of student records.

Policy Regarding Harassment or Abuse

Western Academy is committed to preserving an environment free of sexual harassment or abuse. Sexual harassment or abuse consists of unwelcome conduct of a sexual nature (visual, physical, or verbal) that creates an intimidating, hostile, or offensive environment. Complaints or concerns regarding violations of this policy should be reported to the Headmaster (or another member of the Administrative Council) and will be promptly investigated by the Administrative Council. Retaliation against anyone lodging a complaint will not be tolerated. Violators of this policy will be subject to appropriate disciplinary action.

Discipline

The Western Academy faculty strives to work with parents so that punishments assigned to students redress and correct the wrong and help the boys to improve. The faculty and staff do not practice corporal punishment.

Suspension/Expulsion

Major disciplinary issues are a direct matter of concern of the Administrative Council. Depending on the severity of the incident, a student may serve an in-school suspension, an out-of-school suspension, or be expelled. Western Academy reserves the right to exercise good judgment in suspending or expelling a student. The Administrative Council votes to expel students from Western Academy.

V. Faculty

A Vocation of Service

In their vocation to teach and lead boys, the faculty members of Western Academy strive to work closely with parents. Each teacher aspires to be a good mentor to the boys in the classroom, on the sports field, as an advisor, on field trips and through extracurricular activities. In all these environments the teacher serves by supporting the mission of the school: to assist parents in the intellectual, moral, physical and spiritual education of their sons.

Communication and Contacts

Parents are encouraged to contact any faculty member with questions or concerns. All teachers can be reached by calling the main number or by email. Email addresses of teachers consist of their first name followed by a period and their last name @westernacademy.net. For example, John Smith would be john.smith@westernacademy.net. Teachers are available until 4:00 p.m. on most days and can be available after hours as necessary. Students are encouraged to meet with teachers after school if they have questions or need extra help. Please consult the Western Academy website (www.westernacademy.net) for a list of faculty responsibilities.

VI. Facilities

All members of the Western Academy community — students, faculty, and parents — can and should take pride in our beautiful campus and facilities. The school buildings, the classrooms, the furniture, and the surrounding properties should be treated with respect. Students who deface or damage any of the above will be subject to severe disciplinary measures.

Visitors

All visitors must check in at the main office upon arrival.

Emergencies

Western Academy faculty and staff are certified in CPR and First Aid. The school cooperates with local fire and police departments to ensure the safety of the students.

Classrooms

Students must respect all materials in a classroom as the classroom represents the place on campus most associated with an elevated tone of study. Students should only occupy classrooms when a teacher or proctor is present.

Off-Limits Areas

The following areas are off-limits to students: all administrative offices, the faculty rooms, the foyer outside the chapel, the athletic field (without faculty accompaniment), workshop areas, behind the Beorn Hall stage, storage areas, and the faculty lunchroom and kitchen.

The Chapel

The Chapel is a place of worship. The Blessed Sacrament is reserved in the tabernacle throughout the school year. Students should act with reverence in the Chapel and should avoid distracting behavior in the areas outside the Chapel when in use.

Mass is celebrated every day at 10:05 a.m. Students, parents, and faculty are welcome to attend. Please check the School Calendar for any changes to the Mass schedule.

Regular chapel periods take place for each homeroom class every three weeks. During these periods the school chaplain gives a brief talk on some point relevant to the development of spiritual life and the growth in human virtues. The school chaplain is also available for the Sacrament of Reconciliation at posted times or by appointment.

VII. Spirituality

The spiritual direction of Western Academy is entrusted to Opus Dei, a personal prelature of the Catholic Church. All other aspects of the school are the responsibilities of the Board of Directors or the Administrative Council.

Opus Dei's purpose is to foster among men and women of every walk of life a profound awareness of the universal call to holiness and apostolate, pursued freely and with a sense of responsibility, in their ordinary work and place in society.

Founded in 1928 by Saint Josemaria Escriva de Balaguer, Opus Dei received its definitive juridical approval by the Holy See in 1982. It began in the United States in 1949 in Chicago and now serves in over twenty-five cities in the United States and in over sixty countries worldwide.

VIII. Statement of Principles and Values

The following principles and values form the foundation upon which we have built Western Academy, and from them we derive our mission and direct all of our work.

Truth

We understand that all things are created and held in existence by One who is uncreated existence itself, who is God.

We recognize man as a creature endowed with an immaterial intellect, designed to see the truth of reality by interacting with creation (especially others) through his material body, informed by senses and moved by the will.

We see in creation a place filled with immense mystery and beauty, superficially complex and deeply ordered, designed to evoke in us a profound sense of wonder and awe calling us to seek the One who holds all this magnificence in existence.

We see as an intrinsic, intentional incompleteness which compels us toward its cultivation.

We see this interactive cultivation as the intended, intrinsic work of man: co-operating with God in the cultivation of creation, allowing man to know the truth of God more clearly, and simultaneously making God more "visible" in creation.

We believe our complete fulfillment and final end to be an eternal beholding of that One whom we are all seeking.

We also perceive that man must freely choose his end, and that his life on Earth is the means by which he chooses.

We view this life, not as a ridged step by step process for procuring our reward, but as a flexible, ever-changing co-operation with God whereby we seek the truth, do what it calls for, and thus choose our final, eternal end.

We hold therefore, that everything we do in this life has eternal significance, and therefore what we do should be guided by and directed at the One, i.e., the Truth.

Truth and Faith

We are aware that intimations of these fundamental realities of human existence may arise naturally in our hearts and minds, but that full realization of them surpasses our natural powers and necessitates supernatural help.

We believe that only by God's assistance (Grace), His communication to man (Revelation), and our assent to these revealed truths (Faith) are we capable of contextualizing creation, and of seeing and living the truthfully.

We believe the fullness of God's revelation is Jesus Christ—God become man.

We believe Jesus entrusted the Truth of revelation to the Catholic Church, the certainty of which is guarded and articulated by its Magisterium as the final authority concerning divinely revealed truth, and the true moral conduct of mankind; and this is where we, as a school grounded in the Catholic faith, turn for guidance and clarity.

All of this is what we mean by Truth.

Education, Parents, School

We know that man begins life not fully developed, and everything we do at every moment effects our development; from the moment we are born through the entirety of our lives, what we do makes us what we are.

We understand the aim of education then, is to aid in the development of the basic powers of each person so that he may best be able to choose his way in life—truthfully—and with the utmost freedom: a competent intellect directing harmonious desires.

We recognize that because each man is a free, self-determining creature, his development ultimately depends upon his own free choice and action.

We also know that man cannot arrive at these things on his own. He is designed to depend upon caretakers and guides to lead him as he develops toward autonomous adulthood. This guiding and leading is what we call education (educere—to lead forth).

That is why a fundamental tenet of Western Academy is that education is the primary right and responsibility of the parents, the natural caretakers of their children, and that the school exists to assist them in their task of developing the freedom of their children.

Culture

We see that, because of man's inbuilt drive to make sense of everything he perceives combined with his natural tendency to imitate, the most powerful educative force is culture.

We understand culture to mean the ever-present, all-encompassing circumstances of the surrounding environment, the most important of which is the example of other persons, especially one's caretakers (inside and outside Western Academy).

Therefore, it is essential that everyone involved at Western Academy recognize that they are simultaneously beneficiaries of, and contributors to a Christian culture which is directed at and guided by Truth.

In light of this, it is critical that a mutual understanding and effort exists between all persons working at Western Academy, the parents who entrust their children to these persons, and the students themselves: that all bear a responsibility to strive to live according to the Truth as articulated above, thus giving worthy example and generating true culture.

The same is true for all facilities, curriculum, classes, sports, events, etc. at Western Academy; everything that contributes to the environment of our school, including all activities, no matter how inconsequential, should be considered in the light of Truth for the sake of this culture.

Personal Friendship

We know too that culture is not sufficient for man's full development, rather he is designed as a social creature needing personal, loving relationships guided by and directed at truth.

We call these relationships friendships, and recognize only in a context of true friendship, where one understands that he is known and affirmed as a person, can authentic education occur.

We recognize that authentic friendship can have many forms: parents and children, teachers and students, parents and teachers, and all contribute to the good of a community.

We believe too that the more one is known and develops friendships, the more he is able to develop into his true self, and thus live his true life.

That is why at Western we are committed to maintaining a school size that allows for everyone to know everyone, and to an advisory program where students receive personal attention regularly.

Boys

We believe that a person is created in accordance with God's idea of that person, and intrinsic to that idea is one's sexual identity: male and female, he created them.

We recognize the equality of dignity and value of every person, but that important intended distinctions distinguish men from women.

We also understand that because of these distinctions and their sensitive growth during adolescence, it is of exceedingly great benefit to the development of boys that they are educated at school in an all-boy environment.

We find too, that an all-male faculty striving to live truthful lives provides the most beneficial situation for the full development of the boys.

Thus, we are committed to an all-boy student body lead by an all-male faculty, where the boys are allowed and encouraged to live out and develop their true masculinity, guided by the example of men who try to embody the principles and values articulated in this Statement.

Intellectual Cultivation

We understand that the primary activity of our school is the cultivation of the boys' intellectual powers, because all man does—personal, social, professional, moral etc.—he does by the direction of his intellect.

We know too that in this life man's intellect operates rationally: intellectually ordering ideas by means of acquiring images, thinking about their meaning, receiving insight, making conclusions, and integrating these with previous ideas.

We call this process reasoning, and it is most effectively and efficiently achieved with the guidance of one who already possesses this power, and who is aware that the student must go through it himself to grow intellectually.

We are aware that man's intellect exists for seeing truth, and by necessity its cultivation depends upon an clear, truthful presentation of reality.

Therefore, at Western, all of our classes ought to be constructed and carried out with the ultimate aim of developing in the boys their power of reason: the content must be in accord with a Truthful depiction of reality, and the presentation reasonable.

Emotional/Sensorial Cultivation

We recognize also that in addition to erroneous images, one's perception of reality can be distracted or skewed by one's interior emotional and sensorial disharmony, which strongly attracts one's intellectual attention.

We know that in addition to distracting one from academic interest, this is particularly problematic in matters where moral decisions are concerned; because what would "feel" most pleasurable is not always indicative of what "is" best to do.

We also are aware that all men are prone to this disharmony of emotions and senses (passions), and that to harmonize them is to have them operating in accord with reason, and reason with the Truth.

We are certain that this happens only through repeated activity, freely chosen, guided by and directed at the Truth.

That is why at Western all of us must be working to cultivate in the boys an awareness and understanding of their passions; and also provide for them an appropriate level of freedom so they may "work" them, balanced against the corrective force of consequence, which should always have this harmony as its aim.

Spiritual Cultivation

We also rejoice in the understanding that God has revealed Himself as Father and Friend, and ceaselessly entreats us to approach and encounter Him personally.

We recognize that in His loving understanding, God affords us the possibility to encounter Him at every moment, in and through everything we do; since He is the One who is holding everything in existence, all things serve as opportunities to encounter Him.

We know that because of this, these encounters are not restricted to explicitly religious acts or activities; on the contrary, it is precisely in and through our everyday activities (which include explicitly religious acts) where we are supposed to encounter God personally.

We see that such an understanding allows for man to live life as he was meant to live it, freely turning all circumstances and events of his life into encounters with God, thus making Him more present in us and in the world.

That is why we consider everything that happens at Western Academy--playing, praying, teaching, learning, acting, attending Mass, competing, etc.—to be possible encounters with God, and encourage everyone to share in the joy and fruit which such a realization brings.

Responsibility of Parents and Students

As stated above, these principles and values form the foundation upon which we have built Western Academy, and from them we derive our mission and direct all of our work. Therefore, it is necessary that upon enrolling their son in our school, parents and their son understand that they are freely agreeing to uphold and abide by these principles and values, and that all involved in the running of Western Academy are agreeing to do the same, so that a true partnership with the school may exist for the authentic education of their sons, and for the benefit of the whole Western Academy community.
